Abstract

In this research we propose ...

This research aims to document endangered traditional Haitian dance rhythms, particularly Rada, Lejou, Annavankat, and Kwazele 8, which are still practiced in rural areas of the South, Southeast, and Artibonite departments. These ancestral artistic expressions are threatened by oblivion and remain largely undocumented.

The project also extends to mythical figures from Haitian folktales, Vodou traditions, and carnival, as well as ancestral Haitian dishes, which are central elements of the country’s culinary identity.

The research approach includes:

- Field investigations (interviews with practitioners, video recordings, documentation of traditional dishes and mythical figures).
- A historical and cultural analysis, based on the few existing documents.
- The production of a bilingual publication (French and English) and a

Introduction

Problem Statement

Haitian traditional dances, ancestral dishes, and mythical figures are insufficiently documented and risk disappearing due to the lack of transmission and written sources. Yet, these elements represent a significant cultural and anthropological heritage essential to Haitian and Caribbean identity.

Relevance to Wikimedia Projects

This project will enhance Wikipedia, Wikimedia Commons, Wikisource, and Wikibooks by providing:

- Multimedia content (images, videos).

- Historical and ethnographic data.
- Oral testimonies and traditional recipes.

Research Questions

- What are the historical and cultural origins of the Rada, Lejou, Annavankat, and Kwazele 8 dances?
- What are their unique characteristics and rituals?
- How do practitioners and communities perceive the importance of preserving these traditions?
- How can multimedia and written documentation support cultural transmission?

Date: The proposed works begin on July 1, 2025 and end on June 30, 2026.

Related work

Existing research on Haitian cultural heritage has primarily focused on voodoo, folklore, and general cuisine, with little documentation of the specific dances, mythical figures, and ancestral dishes covered in this study.

- **Traditional dances:** While scholars like Jean Fouchard have explored Haitian dance, the Rada, Lejou, Annavankat, and Kwazele 8 rhythms remain largely undocumented.
- **Mythical figures:** Ethnographic studies mention folklore but lack visual documentation and community

perspectives.

- **Ancestral dishes:** Research focuses on popular Haitian cuisine, neglecting lesser-known traditional recipes and preparation techniques.

This project fills these gaps by providing multimedia documentation, integrating community perspectives, and enhancing open knowledge through Wikimedia projects. It contributes to the preservation and accessibility of Haitian intangible heritage.

Methods

This study employs a **mixed-methods approach**, combining **ethnographic fieldwork, surveys, interviews, multimedia documentation, and journalistic writing** to address the research questions on traditional Haitian dances, mythical figures, and ancestral dishes.

1. Data Collection

Ethnographic Fieldwork

- Conducted in rural communities of **South, Southeast, and Artibonite**, where these traditions are still practiced.
- Visits to cultural events, local ceremonies, and family gatherings to observe **dances, rituals, and food preparation** in their authentic contexts.
- Video and photo documentation of **dancers, storytellers, and traditional cooks** to capture movement techniques,

oral history, and cooking methods.

Interviews & Oral Histories

- **Semi-structured interviews** with practitioners (dancers, elders, voodoo priests, carnival performers, and cooks) to document their knowledge and experiences.
- **Focus groups** with local communities to discuss the **cultural significance and evolution** of these traditions.
- **Oral history recording**, including **songs, myths, and dance-related stories**, for preservation and analysis.

Surveys

- **Structured questionnaires** designed to assess the **community's perception of cultural heritage, transmission challenges, and willingness to contribute to documentation efforts**.
- Participants selected through **snowball sampling**, starting with key practitioners and expanding within communities.
- Data collected through **in-person and online surveys**, ensuring participation from **urban and diaspora communities**.

2. Data Analysis & Documentation

Qualitative Analysis

- **Thematic coding** of interview transcripts to identify recurring **cultural symbols, meanings, and**

historical references.

- Comparative analysis of **dance movements, mythological narratives, and culinary techniques** across different regions.

Historical & Comparative Analysis

- Cross-referencing oral histories with **existing academic literature, archives, and historical documents**.
- Analysis of **visual and textual sources** to track changes in **dance styles, character depictions, and recipes** over time.

Multimedia Processing & Wikimedia Documentation

- **Editing and annotation** of videos and images for Wikimedia Commons.
- Translation and transcription of interviews for **bilingual publication (French & English)** on Wikisource and Wikibooks.
- Integration of **structured data into Wikidata** for linking **cultural elements with existing knowledge databases**.

Journalistic Writing for Reliable Sources

- Using **recorded interviews and research findings**, we will produce **press articles** to strengthen the availability of **verifiable and reliable sources** on these topics.

- Articles will be published in **local and international media**, providing **credible references** that can be used for Wikipedia and other documentation projects.

3. Community Participation & Ethical Considerations

- Participants will **retain ownership and credit** for their contributions.
- **Free, prior, and informed consent** will be obtained for all recordings and interviews.
- Workshops will be held post-research to **share findings with local communities** before publication.

By using a participatory, open-access, and media-inclusive approach, this study ensures that **Haitian intangible cultural heritage is documented, analyzed, and preserved for future generations**, while also improving **source reliability for Wikimedia projects**.

Our project will generate a diverse range of **academic, multimedia, and public-facing outputs** aimed at **documenting, preserving, and disseminating knowledge** about Haitian traditional dances, mythical characters, and ancestral dishes.
