Wikimedia Research Grant Proposal 2025

Cultural Heritage Edit-a-Thon: Oltenia, Romania & Severozapaden, Bulgaria

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Abstract

This project proposes a collaborative documentation of the cultural heritage in two disadvantaged regions of Southeast Europe: Oltenia (Romania) and Severozapaden (Bulgaria). These areas face economic, cultural, and media marginalization, and their lack of visibility on Wikipedia exacerbates imbalances in the representation of heritage.

By organizing an edit-a-thon, the project aims to:

- · Address biases in media and Wikipedia.
- Expand the encyclopedic coverage of the local heritage of these regions.
- Engage local communities, historians, and volunteers in documenting historical monuments, with a focus on old churches.
- Publish the contributions on Wikipedia in English, Romanian, and Bulgarian, using academic and archival sources.

This initiative will contribute to the expansion and diversification of Wikipedia content, facilitating a collaborative framework among university professors, students, and local communities.

Introduction Previous Work

The Problem Addressed

The regions of Oltenia (Romania) and Severozapaden (Bulgaria) suffer from economic and cultural marginalization, a phenomenon well-documented in European Commission reports. These areas face accelerated demographic decline, reduced investments, and low visibility in the public and media spheres.

Despite their rich cultural heritage, these regions are underrepresented on Wikipedia, perpetuating informational and cultural imbalances. The absence of articles about historical monuments, local traditions, and cultural figures affects the global perception of these regions,

reinforcing media bias and exclusion from the digital discourse.

Through this project, we aim to address this underrepresentation by providing a collaborative documentation platform to bring Oltenia and Severozapaden to the forefront of encyclopedic knowledge.

This initiative aligns with the Wikimedia Foundation's global efforts to promote cultural heritage in underrepresented regions.

Importance for Wikipedia

For many communities, Wikipedia serves as the only window to the world. The regions of Oltenia and Severozapaden are not just geographical spaces but zones of exclusion—economically isolated, without investments, and lacking voices to represent them adequately. Their absence from Wikipedia is not accidental: they have not been deemed significant enough to be included in the global digital narrative. This absence reflects not just a lack of documentation but a profound void in perspective.

This project does not seek to jingoistically glorify these places but to affirm their reality—poverty, depopulation, lack of cultural infrastructure, and the absence of a vision to integrate them into a development circuit. Through field research, I will recover fragments of memory that might otherwise be lost, integrating them into a broader process of digital recognition.

Publishing this information on Wikipedia means more than enriching its content. It is an act of resistance against oblivion, a way to make these places visible beyond the economic statistics that define them as "underdeveloped zones." Digital visibility does not guarantee change, but it provides a starting point, an anchor for those who wish to research, understand, and perhaps intervene.

As a university professor and researcher, I consider Wikipedia not just a repository of knowledge but a space for reconstruction—where stories left in the shadows can be brought back to the forefront. I will write about this project in academic journals to demonstrate how the digitization of heritage can become a bridge between the past and the future. In a world where what does not exist online seems not to exist at all, it is essential for these regions to be documented.

This edit-a-thon is not about giving these regions a better place in public discourse—it is about affirming them as part of historical, economic, and cultural reality, with all their limitations, contradictions, and urgent need for recognition.

This initiative contributes to:

- Correcting the representation bias of marginalized regions in Southeast Europe.
- Increasing the visibility of cultural heritage (preserved in these regions for over two centuries but rarely restored) through well-documented, on-site articles.
- Access to academic and archival sources for content development.

• With great respect, I will write about and promote the Wikipedia platform in academic

journals.

Research Questions

1. How can participatory documentation (edit-a-thon) influence the representation of

disadvantaged regions on Wikipedia?

2. What factors determine the underrepresentation of the cultural heritage of Oltenia and

Severozapaden?

3. What are the most effective methods for integrating local sources into Wikipedia

articles?

Date

Project Duration Project period: July 1, 2025 - June 30, 2026

Previous Work

The undersigned has previously conducted historical and linguistic research (in national

archives and on-site) on the feudal period of Romanian history, focusing on the specific area of southern Romania and northern Greece. These studies explored Romanian society and the

migration of populations during the 19th century, from Greece to Romania.

Related work

Edit-a-thons have been successfully used to document cultural heritage, combat gender bias,

and increase access to academic sources. This project builds on such initiatives and extends

them to marginalized geographical areas.

Recent studies (Ferran-Ferrer et al., 2024) highlight that edit-a-thon events significantly

contribute to closing representation gaps. Based on these findings, I propose applying this

method to document 19th-century cultural heritage (a decisive century for the consolidation of

Balkan nations—socially, linguistically, and territorially) in the regions of Oltenia and

Severozapaden.

- Examination of bias trends in Wikipedia content.
- Surveys for participants regarding the challenges of documenting heritage.

Expected output

- Publishing Wikipedia articles in 4 languages: English, Romanian, Bulgarian, and Greek.
- Academic contributions published on the digitization of heritage.
- Development of a best practices guide for edit-a-thons.

Risks

- · Potential difficulties in obtaining archival sources.
- Low participation at events. These risks will be managed through alternative plans and local collaborations.

Community impact plan

- Involvement of local communities (historians, students, volunteers).
- Promotion of the project through academic journals and conferences.

Evaluation

To measure the success of this project, we will use the following evaluation metrics:

Academic Impact:

- · Number of new Wikipedia articles and contributions.
- Translations of research results on Wikipedia into 4 languages: English, Romanian, Bulgarian, and Greek.
- Diversification of Wikipedia content by adding articles on the concepts of Orthodox religion in Southeast Europe.
- · Quality of academic sources utilized.
- Publication of results in academic journals.

Community Involvement:

- · Participation in the edit-a-thon.
- Engagement of historians, students, and local volunteers.

Impact on Media Bias:

· Comparison of the visibility of marginalized regions on Wikipedia before and after the

project.

• Evaluation of the balance between local and international sources.

Recommendations for Wikimedia:

Development of a best practices guide.

Feedback on the documentation process and its adoption.
